#### **Training Corner**

The Tally Step (sometimes referred to as a pace step) is a measurement of distance often used in the woods, or areas/situations where a tape measure would be difficult or take too much time. Each searcher has a different tally step, based on the stride length of the searcher. To figure out what your tally step would be you will need a tape measure or rope of known length. Lay the tape on a flat even surface, making sure the tape is stretched out without any kinks in it. Start at one end of the tape with your feet together. Take one step, that is half of a tally step, take another step and you will have completed one tally step. Walk the full length of the tape, counting the number of tally steps it takes to complete the length of rope. Repeat two more times. Take the length of the rope divided by your number of tally steps. That will tell you how many feet are in your tally step. For example: if you had a 100 foot tape, it took you 20 tally steps to go from one end to the other. 100/20=5ft. If you are told to search a section 50 feet off the road, you would begin your tally step at the edge of the road and count to 10 and you would be approximately 50 feet from the road and ready to begin searching.
